Passports aren't required. Washrooms on the boat have limited accessibility.

The Palaces and Palisades 1000 Islands Cruise features the Canadian Palisades (a long cliff that runs along the Canadian shore) where a five-metre-tall white limestone statue of St. Lawrence watches over the river that bears his name.

The cruise sails under the 1000 Islands International Bridge and through a stretch of cottage country known as Millionaire's Row. You'll see Boldt Castle*, which was built as a tribute to George Boldt's wife, who tragically died before the castle was finished. You'll see Zavikon Island and Cherry Island — with the Casablanca grand estate, built in 1892.

With so many beautiful homes and so much spectacular scenery, the area is a photographer's paradise.

This means that without getting approval for an above guideline increase, Homestead can't raise 2026 rents more than 2.1%.

Regular events in more detail

Updates

Here are updates on items that previous newsletters mentioned. Subsequent newsletters will update items if new info is available.

Above guideline rent increases for 185 and 195 Clearview:

The July newsletter gave a synopsis of the results of the two case management hearings that the Landlord and Tenant Board held that allowed Homestead and the tenants of each building to agree on the above guideline rent increase that Homestead had applied for. The hearings were June 25 and 26. In the hearings, the LTB rep said that the board usually issues its order to the landlord in around a month of a hearing.

As of this writing, there's no news on whether the LTB has issued the orders.

Above guideline rent increase for 200 Clearview: For the same timeframe as for 185 and 195 Clearview, some tenants of 200 Clearview received notices of an above guideline rent increase. As of this writing, the LTB hasn't yet scheduled a case management hearing.

Here are Homestead's application and supporting documents.

Fourth tower, 210 Clearview Ave.: On July 9, a video conference was held on a minor-variance application associated with the upcoming fourth tower to the west of 200 Clearview. You might have seen small signs outside 200 Clearview announcing the application and hearing.

In October 2023, council approved Homestead's application for a zoning by-law amendment to allow a height increase. It was later discovered that some provisions were excluded. Minor variances were needed to make the site plan comply with the by-law, hence the application and hearing. The application was unopposed and passed unanimously.

Rent reduction: \$ \$ The July newsletter said that starting in 2025 the city reduced property taxes paid by owners of multi-unit residential buildings built before 2001. The tax ratio was reduced from 1.4 to 1.0, to be phased in over four years.

A person at the city's finance department confirmed that council did approve the tax reduction for 2025, reducing the ratio from 1.4 to 1.3 (a 7.14% reduction).

According to info on the Landlord and Tenant Board website, if a tax reduction is more than 2.49% (which 7.14% is), an automatic rent reduction is triggered. For buildings with seven or more units, rent is decreased by 20% of 7.14%, or 1.43%.

What's in the 'hood?

When you start across Champlain Bridge from Island Park Towers, the first island you cross is Riopelle and the second is Cunningham, neither of which are accessible.

But you can get onto the next one: **Bate Island**, at a mere 1.5 km from IPT.

Bate Island is named after Henry Bate, the first chairman of the Ottawa Improvement Commission, for-runner of the NCC. Riopelle and Cunningham were also commission chairmen.

Champlain Bridge has a postdelimited bike lane on both sides and a sidewalk on the east side, so active transport is fairly safe and easy.

In spring high water, the north side of the island is a popular put-in spot for kayakers and surf-boarders. It's also a popular spectator point for watching the show.

In 2024, the Tavern on the Island opened for a summer food and beverage service of casual fare.

The city has between June 1 and September 15 to send notification of the rent reduction to Homestead and between October 1 and December 15 to send notification to tenants. The reduction takes effect December 31.

More info will follow in a subsequent newsletter.

Graham Spry Building, 250 Lanark Ave.: In the July newsletter, I gave a synopsis of the video conference I attended about the shelter that's been operating at 250 Lanark Avenue since January 2024. I said the city plans to reduce the capacity from 60 to 40, accept woman only, and close it at the end of June.

Councillor Jeff Leiper says the intent was not to close the shelter at the end of June, but to close it as soon as it's not need. New facilities have opened in the city, so the hope is that 250 Lanark will close soon. The capacity has been capped at 40, and the facility is for women only.

IPTRA Code of Conduct

This Code of Conduct outlines the expectations, guidelines, and standards of behaviour for all members and attendees of IPTRA. It governs behaviour during activities, events, meetings, and any interactions between members and attendees. By participating in IPTRA events, members and attendees agree to abide by this Code.

A. Members and Attendees Responsibilities

All IPTRA members and attendees shall:

- Act honestly, ethically, and with integrity, avoiding any behaviour that could harm the IPTRA's reputation or values.
- Be responsible and accountable for their actions and ensure that guests understand and adhere to IPTRA expectations.
- Welcome everyone from different cultures and backgrounds.
- Treat all individuals with dignity, listen to and respect their rights and opinions, and refrain from discriminatory or derogatory remarks or actions.
- Be mindful of the impact of their words and actions on others, avoiding bullying, harassment, intimidation, or inappropriate behaviour in any form.

IPTRA members and attendees shall not:

• Display or condone the use of inappropriate or abusive language, bullying, harassment, discrimination, physical violence, or conduct that may be construed as unethical. This includes all forms of communication, such as email, phone, and/or social media but not limited to these forms of communication.

B. Executive Committee Responsibilities

Executive Committee members shall:

- Actively contribute to the effective work of the Executive by regularly attending and preparing for meetings.
- Demonstrate diligence in performing their Executive responsibilities.
- Act only in the interests of IPTRA as a whole, not for individuals or small groups.
- Apply judgment carefully, making decisions that are transparent, objective, impartial, and fair, and based on an analysis of all available and relevant information.
- Keep discussions on Executive differences of opinion within the committee. Outside parties should not be involved.
- Declare any actual or potential conflicts of interest.
- Use concise and forthright written and oral communication.
- Seek ways to reasonably accommodate members' and attendees' needs
- Manage IPTRA funds to maximize value for money in all financial dealings.
- Follow the prescribed policies and procedures for receiving, recording, handling, and protecting money.
- Inform members about the Code of Conduct, its importance, and any updates or changes.
- Apply the Code of Conduct fairly and consistently, addressing any breaches promptly and appropriately.

C. Conflict Resolution

The Executive will attempt to resolve conflicts and disputes respectfully, using constructive

communication and seeking peaceful resolutions.

Conflict resolution process is:

- The event co-ordinator will be the first to intervene.
- If this is not successful, the Executive co-presidents will attempt to resolve the conflict on a personal meeting with the offending party.
- Identify the issues.
- Identify common goals.
- Identify expected outcomes and the steps to achieving these.
- Desired behaviour is to commence immediately.

D. Consequences

- If the offending party makes the desired changes, then decide to take no further action.
- If the offending party will not effect the desired change, they will no longer be permitted to participate in the event for 30 days.

E. Executive Breaches of the Code

- If a member or attendee believes that the Code has been breached by one of the Executive, the following procedure will begin:
- Initiation of an informal discussion with the person of concern, referring to specific parts of this Code by two of the Executive
- If the informal discussion does not resolve the issue, the Conflict Resolution will apply.
- If the offending party makes the desired changes, then decide to take no further action.
- If the offending party will not effect the desired change, they will no longer be permitted to be a member of the Executive committee for 30 days.



Fast & frugal fixins



One of our members suggested publishing quick and inexpensive suitable-for-one recipes every so often. If you have one you'd like to share, email it to newsletter@iptra.org.

Here's a fast and frugal recipe for a 9-inch crustless quiche. It makes a meal for two or for one with leftovers. I tested the recipe with the additions of aged cheddar, a pinch of smoked paprika, and fresh baby kale, topped with fresh dill. Success!

Quick crustless quiche

6 large eggs 1 cup whole milk

1/2 tsp salt

1/4 tsp freshly ground black pepper

1 tsp Dijon mustard

pinch ground nutmeg or paprika

1.5 cups additions (see below)

2/3 cup grated Gruyère or aged cheddar

2 tbsp chopped fresh chives, dill, basil, or parsley

Additions (solo or in any combination)

- crumbled cooked bacon or cubed cooked ham
- steamed chopped broccoli or asparagus
- sautéed chopped mushrooms
- roasted chopped vegetables
- chopped fresh baby spinach or kale
- 1. Preheat the oven to 350° F.
- 2. Oil a deep 9" pie plate.
- 3 In a large bowl, combine the first set of ingredients.
- 4. Prepare and assemble the additions of your choice.
- 5. Scatter on the bottom of the plate, then sprinkle with cheese.
- 6. Carefully pour in the egg mixture.
- 7. Sprinkle with your herb of choice.
- 8. Place on a rimmed baking sheet.
- 9. Bake until puffed and golden at the edges, 35 to 45 minutes, depending on the moisture content of the additions.
- 10. Let cool a few minutes, cut into wedges, and serve.
